

BRYAN MOUNTAIN NORDIC SKI PATROL

The Bryan Mountain Nordic Ski Patrol (BMNSP) was founded in 1974 with 12 members as the first registered Nordic component of the National Ski Patrol west of the Mississippi River. BMNSP has since grown to over 50 members. All BMNSP patrollers are trained in CPR and Outdoor Emergency Care, skiing, toboggan handling, search and rescue, winter survival, ski mountaineering and avalanche safety.

Dedicated to service and safety, the goal of the patrol is to prevent trouble and accidents before they occur. This is accomplished through a 4-fold program.

The first is public education. BMNSP offers courses in many aspects of skiing, winter recreation, and safety. Certified instructors from BMNSP teaches CPR and Outdoor Emergency Care courses. BMNSP also teaches course in avalanche safety, ski mountaineering, and winter survival with National Ski Patrol instructors.

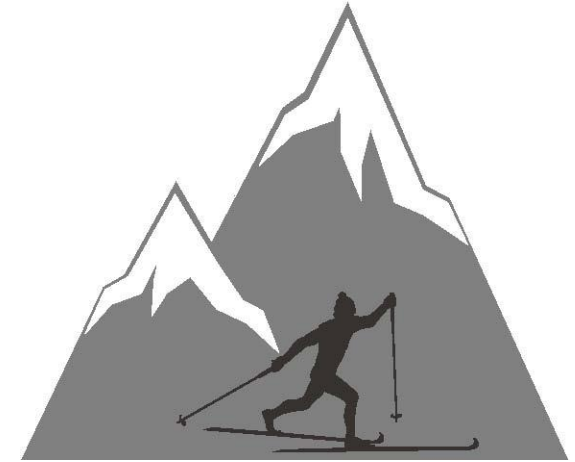
Second, BMNSP members spend a great deal of time training to maintain proficiency and teaching skills.

Members also patrol frequently used trails and are available to the public for help and advice on safe skiing.

Lastly, members are available for search and rescue missions, as needed, through the Colorado Search & Rescue Board.

LEVEL I AVALANCHE COURSE

National Ski Patrol

The Level I curricula was jointly developed by the American Avalanche Association, U.S.D.A. Forest Service National Avalanche Center, and the National Ski Patrol.

The course objectives are:

- Identify avalanche terrain and make routefinding decisions
- Identify weak and strong layers
- Perform field tests to appreciate snow stability/instability
- Recognize weather, terrain, and snowpack factors contributing to instability
- Perform small group rescue
- Perform fast and efficient transceiver
